"There seems a magic in the very name of Christmas—" -CHARLES DICKENS (Guest Editorial by Chaplain Thomas D. Byrne)



There is something magic about Christmas. People are different. Everybody is more cheerful, exchanging hearty greetings and good wishes. The Christmas spirit has an almost miraculous effect upon everything we do and say during the season. All things conspire to create a merry time. Though some are rushed in preparation for the day, though some must stick to their jobs, and some face strange and new experiences in the

days to come, all feel the effect. Even on our fighting fronts and fighting ships at sea and in the air, men will know it is Christmas, and will feel a lift as they remember the happy times at home. The family waiting patiently at home for news and the return of loved ones will be a little happier because of the season, and the worker in the factory will know that he is helping to hasten the return of the real old Christmas. People are all just naturally better at Christmas time.

The magic is that people change during the season. No longer preoccupied with their own pursuits and pleasures, they are out to buy presents for Mom and Dad, wife, child and friend. They are addressing and mailing cards of good cheer. Their meetings with others are the occasions for wishing them the best of everything. They are planning meals to make the time happier. Some are hanging decorations that others may feel more of the spirit Christmas brings. The change is from pure self-interest to an interest in everything and everybody.

The most satisfying things we can do are the things we forget ourselves in, for then our minds and hearts are occupied in worthwhile activity. Even time seems to pass all too quickly. I was asked to write this editorial because I had something to do with a show that offered a bit of entertainment for this post. Everyone who worked on that show did a lot on his or her own time. We all had fun and got pleasure from it, and our greatest concern was not who would get the credit for it, but that the show would be well received and that it would mean a few additional moments of merriment to our fellow soldiers. There are many who have done similar things. Their reward has been the feeling of something accomplished, of some contribution made to the general good.

Here is the fundamental thing that makes Christmas a magic season. People are out to do something for somebody else, and are bent upon a happy and merry time. And He whose birthday this season celebrates would not find this spirit out of place. He came to work for others, to bring about a change in the lives of men, and He called that change the abundant life. He did not come to make people sad and gloomy. Never was He accused of being stuffy and formal. Rather did He express contempt for the class of His day who were stuffy and too formal in their religion, and these same people talked against Him because they thought Him too liberal. He came to free men of superstition and meanness, and to make life generous, noble and happy.

The change worked in people by Christmas magic is the change He would work. It is a change for the better in the lives of all, a working example of that which we see at this season—a change from smallness to greatness of outlook.

We cannot have Christmas all the year, but we can take into our everyday lives some of its spirit of friendliness and good cheer born of consideration of others and a generous, outgoing attitude toward everybody. Let the change wrought in us by Christmas magic go with us throughout the year.
